Preprint policy

The Japanese Journal of Infectious Diseases (JJID) publishes only original, unpublished work; however, manuscripts previously posted on nonprofit preprint servers (e.g., bioRxiv and medRxiv) will be considered. As defined in "Preprints for the life sciences" (2016, Science 352: 899–901), preprints are the author's version of a research manuscript uploaded to a public server prior to formal peer review at a journal. Preprints may be posted at any time during the peer review process and will not be taken into account when determining the advance provided by a study under consideration at JJID.

During the submission process, authors must indicate where their preprint has been posted, including the digital object identifier (DOI), in their cover letter.

Prior to the final publication, they must also agree to update the archived preprint with the *JJID* DOI and a link to the article published in *JJID*. (Without the completion of the preprint link to *JJID*, the *JJID* editorial office will not be able to finalize the manuscript for publication.)

Although authors may choose any public license they prefer when posting their preprint (including Creative Commons licenses), they must retain copyright of their work.

Preprints may be cited in the reference list of articles under consideration at *JJID*(See *JJID* "Instruction to Authors") .

To check whether posting a manuscript on a preprint server will affect its eligibility for publication, authors may contact JJID at jjid@nih.go.jp.
